Feast of Faith – What Jesus Did, What Jesus Said! The oldest account of what happened at the Last Supper comes to us not from the Gospels but from the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians: "I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me'" (11:23–24). In our celebrations of the Eucharist, we are obedient to Christ's command to "do this." The priest, acting in the person of Christ, does what Jesus did and says what Jesus said. He takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it, and gives it to the Lord's disciples. He takes wine, gives thanks, and shares it with us. We believe that the entire Eucharistic Prayer is consecratory, but we continue to hold these words of Jesus in special reverence. They are called the words of consecration, and the elevations of the host and chalice, the genuflections of the priest, and the optional ringing of a bell and use of incense remind us that we are in the presence of the Lord—Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. TAKING IT HOME

On Sunday, January 15, 2017 at our 10:30 a.m. Mass we will celebrate the Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into Full Communion with the Catholic Church for three individuals. Normally such a rite would ordinarily be celebrated at Easter time after these candidates have participated in a process of formation through the Rite of Christian Initiation. But because each candidate is a fully informed Christian in a faith other than the Catholic faith and because each candidate has already been sharing liturgical life with our faith community, we believe that a more involved process is not necessary. So after a period of helping the candidates understand the sacramental life of the Church, we believe they are ready to be fully received into the life of the Church and of this faith community. The three candidates are Jason Prior, Kimberly Fell and David Haines.

Jason Prior is a baptized Presbyterian, whose father also happens to be a Presbyterian minister. Jason married Tina Serpe here at Resurrection in November of 2006 and they have been attending Resurrection ever since. Jason and Tina have a son Michael, who was baptized at Resurrection and who is currently attending CFP and is preparing to make irst Eucharist this coming May. Jason has the blessing of his father and the desire to join his son in celebrating Eucharist.

Kimberly Fell has been coming to Resurrection since the spring of 2016. She is Methodist but both she and her friend, Greg Aluise, who is Catholic were looking for a faith community in which they could feel at home. They found Resurrection and ever since have been regulars at the 5:30 Sunday mass. Soon Kimberly contacted me about becoming Catholic. She was formed in her faith, but found in Resurrection a faith community she could love.

David Haines and his wife Jean have been Resurrection faithful for many years. They are regulars at the 8:15 Sunday mass. David is Presbyterian, but he is also part of a men's Catholic faith sharing group in Kenneth Square where he lives. Many of his friends in this group have encouraged him to become Catholic, but he pushed back because of his family's Presbyterian heritage. Recently, however, he has come to see that the time is right for him to join his wife so that they can worship together and share the same faith.

Because we Christians recognize the validity of baptism that is proclaimed in the name of the Father, Son and Spirit, there is no need to re-baptize fellow Christians. Baptism happens only once. So for them to be received into the Catholic Church they will make a simple profession of faith and then will be confirmed in the Spirit. Finally they will be able to join with the community in receiving Eucharist for the first time.

We also want to acknowledge those members of our RCIA team who helped to prepare our candidates. They were exceedingly helpful in letting the candidates know that faith is not just an individual experience but is also a communal experience.

2ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME GOSPEL – JOHN 1:29-34

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming toward him and said, ‘Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world. He is the one of whom I said, ‘A man is coming after me who ranks ahead of me because he existed before me.’ I did not know him, but the reason why I came baptizing with water was that he might be made known to Israel.’

John testified further, saying, ‘I saw the Spirit come down like a dove from heaven and remain upon him. I did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, ‘On whomever you see the Spirit come down and remain, he is the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.’ Now I have seen and testified that he is the Son of God.’

Gospel Reflection

Strangely, despite being in Ordinary Time again, the lectionary temporarily departs from the gospel of Matthew and today's reading is from the gospel of John. Given that last week's reading was Matthew's account of the baptism of Christ, we must assume that there is a deliberate purpose in the choice of reading for today. Indeed, the three readings for today give a very specific slant to the baptism and mission of Jesus. The readings from Isaiah and Paul's letter to the Corinthians emphasize that God's salvation is for all the world, not just the people of Israel. We find this also in the gospel when John the Baptist declares, "there is the lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world." It is the sin "of the world" that Jesus takes away; that is, all humankind. This was a tough concept for the Jews whose relationship with God was grounded in the concept of being the "chosen people"; a people set apart. It continues to be a difficult concept for many Christian people today who struggle with the notion that God's love and mercy are so extravagant that they are poured out for absolutely anyone and everyone. Some Christians like to maintain an "us and them" approach to their faith and think that if you're not one of "us" then salvation will be denied by God.

The role of John the Baptist in this passage is to be a witness; to point to Jesus and say "He is the one!" Lots of us need the affirmation and direction provided by another person before we are ready to commit to a new direction in our lives. John gives the crowd confidence and effectively hands over to Jesus the authority that the crowd had perceived in him.

Pointing the way: John the Baptist fills the role of "pointing the way" to Jesus. In our own lives we also have the ability to "point the way" towards Jesus. It doesn't need to be as blatant as John's "Look, there he is!" However, the way we choose to live our life can point the way just as powerfully as John did. More often than not, our actions speak much more powerfully than any words we might utter. Consistently treating others with respect, maintaining prayer as a central part of life, and working for justice in the world will make an impression on others and point the way to Jesus.

Baptism of Jesus: Each of the three synoptic gospels (Mark, Luke and Matthew) presents an account of the baptism of Jesus. All three versions record the Spirit descending in the form of a dove. In the fourth gospel, it is interesting that the gospel writer does not actually give an account of the baptism as by the time of this gospel's writing the story is well entrenched in the Christian culture. Instead of a baptism account, John the Baptist appears to recall the event. Rather than needing to describe the event, this gospel writer treats it as a given and simply refers to it.

Ranking: There is an odd line in today's passage. John reminds the crowd that he had said "A man is coming after me who ranks before me because he existed before me." In Jewish tradition, the prophets and patriarchs who came earlier in their history ranked higher than those who came later. They believed that the history of salvation was at its pinnacle with God's self-revelation to Abraham. Successive episodes and characters were regarded as lesser. But John affirms that Jesus ranks before himself because Jesus existed before John. He is saying that Jesus is more than simply the latest in a long line of prophets.
